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One day, while looking out of a window in Mayapur, a small hamlet near Calcutta, HDG Srila Prabhupada saw a group of children fighting with stray dogs over scraps of food. Deeply moved by the incident, he resolved to ensure that no one within a ten-mile radius of his centre would go hungry. This direction to his followers inspired the genesis of The Akshaya Patra Foundation. It also became the driving force behind all the milestones that the Foundation has achieved.


The Akshaya Patra Foundation

he Akshaya Patra Foundation was started in the year 2000, with the feeding of 1,500 children of five schools in Bengaluru, Karnataka. The Foundation's objective was to support the education and health of the children by providing them hot, nutritious and tasty mid-day meals; thus the vision: *No child in India shall be deprived of education because of hunger*. Basically, Akshaya Patra was borne out of the belief that the assurance of a school lunch can go a long way in making life easier for millions of children by improving their health and encouraging people to send their children to school.

The assurance of a nutritious mid-day meal improves the health of children and serves as an incentive for people to send their children to school instead of sending them to work to support the family. In doing so, it provides these children an opportunity to carve a better future for themselves and their families.

When the Government of India's flagship programme, the Mid-Day Meal (MDM) Scheme—now rechristened PM POSHAN—was launched, Akshaya Patra collaborated with the Central Government and state governments to implement the programme. In 2003, the Foundation signed an MoU with the Government of Karnataka for Akshara Dasoha, thus becoming the first organisation to establish a Public–Private Partnership (PPP) with the government to implement the school feeding programme.

Over the years, Akshaya Patra has collaborated with 15 state governments and 2 UT administrations, reaching out to over 2 million beneficiaries in 67 locations across the country.







Kitchens of Akshaya Patra

kshaya Patra operates in 67 locations in 15 states and 2 union territories across India. In 65 of these locations, it has centralised kitchens. In 2 locations, it has adopted the decentralised model. The vast network of kitchens enables the Foundation to serve over 2 million children. The scale and operational efficiency of these kitchens help Akshaya Patra play a crucial role in maximising the impact of PM POSHAN Abhiyaan and other nutrition welfare initiatives.

Basically, centralised kitchens are semi-automated kitchens with the capacity to undertake large-scale feeding, typically up to 100,000 meals a day whilst ensuring safe handling, preparation and delivery of the food. Typically, a centralised kitchen helps manage operations from a single point of control, which include receiving and storage of raw materials, preparation and delivery of meals and maintenance. Centralised kitchens utilise large and specialised equipment, such as cauldrons, trolleys, rice chutes, etc., to prepare food in huge quantities, thus enabling the feeding of significantly more number of children than school kitchens. These kitchens are known for their cost advantage as they enjoy a greater economy of scale-reductions in unit cost due to the increase in the size of the facility and usage levels of systems and equipment.

In 2006, Akshaya Patra was chosen to be a case study at the Harvard Business School. The case study stated "The centralised kitchen model had the benefits of scale and the best promise for being able to feed the largest number of children for the lowest cost." The centralised approach also works as far as accountability is concerned because thousands of meals are prepared at one location with due adherence to safety and hygiene and the whole process in monitored with due diligence. These kitchens also reduce the burden on teachers overburdened by the pressure of managing mid-day meals besides executing teaching and other administrative duties.

Akshaya Patra has adopted the decentralised model in remote locations where difficult terrain and poor road connectivity hinder the feasibility of setting up a large infrastructure. In decentralised kitchens, local women undertake the cooking process under the guidance and supervision of Akshaya Patra. They are trained in the Foundation's kitchen processes and operations module to ensure that safe, nutritious mid-day meals are cooked and served to children. The model also facilitates community participation as the women are part of the local community. Each decentralised kitchen typically serves one school. However, there are cases where two schools are served by one kitchen as they are on the same premises.



Every kitchen employee follows necessary hygiene practices and wears essential gear and kits to ensure safety and prevent contamination of food during pre-processing and preparation of the meals In a country like India, with a massive population of 1.4 billion people, it is imperative to ensure that nutrition-based welfare programmes, such as the PM POSHAN Abhiyaan, reach as many beneficiaries as possible. At Akshaya Patra, local palate and regional acceptability are given due importance because they are directly related to improved consumption. Therefore, the menu is predominantly rice-based in South India and wheat-based in North India. The Foundation's centralised kitchens help make this possible by fostering innovation in the context of technology as well as recipes. In 2002, Akshaya Patra introduced the first roti-making machine in its kitchen. This machine, with the capacity to dish out 10,000 rotis per hour, helped the organisation cater to children in North India, where the menu is predominantly wheat-based, much more efficiently.

Feeding Programmes

kshaya Patra has harnessed the might of the Public-Private Partnership (PPP) model by bringing the government, philanthropic organisations and individuals on the same platform to address hunger on a scale by feeding children, pregnant women, nursing mothers and vulnerable communities across the country through its various programmes.





PM POSHAN (POshan SHAkti Nirman) Scheme

s the implementing partner of PM POSHAN (formerly the Mid-Day Meal Scheme), Akshaya Patra serves freshly cooked, nutritious and tasty mid-day meals to children in the age group of 6-14 years studying in government and government-aided schools to support their nutrition and education. Similarly, as a part of the ICDS Anganwadi feeding programme, the Foundation provides nutritious meals to children in the age group of up to 6 years and pregnant women and nursing mothers.

Akshaya Patra reaches out to over 2 million children and women in more than 20,000 schools and Anganwadis in 67 locations across 15 states and 2 union territories every school day.





Humanitarian **Relief - Food Assistance**

n India, factors such as large population, high density and vast rural-urban disparity pose an extraordinary challenge as far as food and nutrition security measures are concerned. People from socio-economically weaker sections often lack money to sustain daily needs, such as food and shelter. Natural disasters and disease outbreaks worsen their condition. In response, they are forced to reduce the consumption of food to overcome the economic burden. The compromise is highly detrimental to their health and well-being and makes them further vulnerable during such difficult times.





Since its inception, Akshaya Patra has endeavoured to utilise its kitchen infrastructure and resources to undertake emergency food assistance in the event of natural disasters and other emergencies to provide people food and nutrition support and ensure their health. Over the years, the organisation has enhanced its execution capabilities for humanitarian efforts through need-based approaches, such as the provision of freshly cooked food, utilising its mobile kitchen or setting up a temporary kitchen and the distribution of food relief kits.

The Foundation is mindful of the role of food assistance in humanitarian efforts and has strived to support the government's relief efforts in various parts of the country, right from Gujarat to Assam and Ladakh to Tamil Nadu.



Food Assistance During the COVID-19 Pandemic

kshaya Patra mobilised resources and leveraged partnerships for food assistance to support the government's relief efforts during the COVID-19 pandemic. Over a period of 2 years, the Foundation cumulatively served over 244 million meals to vulnerable people across the country in the form of cooked meals and food relief kits with essential groceries. These included migrant daily-wage earners, construction labourers, industrial workers, rough sleepers, individuals and families who were having a difficult time arranging food for themselves, frontline workers such as doctors, ambulance drivers, police personnel, crematorium staff, etc.











Beyond Feeding

he school lunch programme has been an effective intervention, incentivising education and bringing more children to schools. Akshaya Patra has designed and implemented a series of educational and infrastructural intervention that go beyond the meals to nurture the dreams and aspirations of these children.





National Endeavour for **Student Transformation (NEST)**

he National Endeavour for Student Transformation (NEST) is the flagship initiative of The Akshaya Patra Foundation that engages in the government education system to enhance the quality of education, create an environment which will contribute to improved learning outcomes and build an enjoyable schooling experience. Through these endeavours, Akshaya Patra strives to

- vision and build goodwill among stakeholders

- Encourage and ensure an inclusive learning environment irrespective of economic background or any bias

Digital Education Programme

Akshaya Patra is working towards bridging the digital divide for marginalised students to ensure that they do not miss out on possibilities due to cost or accessibility concerns. Basically, the Digital Education Programme facilitates digital inclusion of students studying in government schools. The Foundation has collaborated with BYJU'S through the EdTech company's 'Education For All' social initiative. The programme provide children access to a world-class digital learning platform with professionally curated content and specialised coaching and an interactive and innovative learning experience.



AVSAR Scholarship Programme

Akshaya Patra facilitates the scholarship programme to incentivise education and support students from marginalised communities to pursue higher studies. It helps these students become financially independent in their pursuit of academic aspirations. It lays the foundation on which they can develop their talents and skills, thus empowering them to make the most of the opportunities that come their way.



School Rejuvenation Programme

Akshaya Patra seeks to provide children a conducive environment at the school through the school rejuvenation programme. Its aim is to ensure that the food safety and quality are maintained during the storage, serving and consumption of the meal. Furthermore, the focus is on creating a safe and comfortable environment for students during the lunch hour. The underlying thought is that an enhanced meal experience can improve food consumption, reduce food wastage and inculcate better eating habits in children.



Abhay Remedial Classes

bhay is a remedial classes initiative designed and implemented by Akshaya Patra. Its objective is to boost children's academic performance through activity-based learning and extracurricular activities, empowering them to carve a better future for themselves. Abhay works on two fronts: first, to boost children's basic learning abilities (i.e., their ability to read simple text and do basic math) through remedial classes, and second, support their overall development through extracurricular activities.

Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)

s the implementing partner of the PM POSHAN, Akshaya Patra has been actively supporting the nation's efforts to address various Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)—some directly and some indirectly. Akshaya Patra's efforts to address the issue of hunger and malnutrition in children by providing them a wholesome meal every school day are in line with SDG 2 – Zero Hunger, while its attempt to address classroom hunger, thus enabling children to focus on academics and extracurricular activities at school are in line with SDG 4 – Quality Education.

Indirectly, the Foundation contributes to various other SDGs, including SDG 1 – No Poverty by helping children get an education and gives them a chance at breaking free from the vicious cycle of poverty, SDG 3 - Good Health and Well-being by improving the nutrition profile of children and having a positive impact on their overall health, SDG 5 - Gender Equality by incentivising education and giving parents a strong reason to send their girl child to school, SDG 7 - Affordable and Clean Energy by adopting environment friendly solar power, electric vehicles (EVs), etc., and SDG 10 - Reduced Inequalities by promoting socialisation by encouraging children to sit together and eat.







Social Impact

kshaya Patra, through its efforts, contributes to various objectives of PM POSHAN; improving the nutritional status of children, encouraging children belonging to disadvantaged sections to attend school, addressing the issue of school dropouts, addressing classroom hunger and ensuring that children concentrate on classroom activities. As all the children, regardless of their socioeconomic background, sit together to have a meal every day, the programme improves social equity. With the assurance of a meal prompting more parents to send their girl child to school, it also contributes to gender equity.

The school feeding programme has an indirect impact on the economic conditions of several families across the country. In providing children access to education, it enables them to break the vicious poverty cycle.

Akshaya Patra employees are from the local communities residing around the kitchen. It is a source of employment, which enables the entry of marginal workers into the organised work sector. In locations where the decentralised system has been adopted, the Foundation hires and trains local women, thus resulting in increased community participation as well as furthering gender equity. The Foundation also furthers community participation by working closely with community leaders, teachers and parents of our beneficiary children.

The assurance of a meal brings children to school. What next? Our School and Student Transformation Programme enhances the impact of mid-day meals by providing the children a conducive environment at the school, nurturing their talent and natural inclinations, helping them with financial aid for higher education, etc.





iplab Murmu is the agriculture minister in the school cabinet. "We cultivate vegetables like pumpkin, beans, ridge gourd and cauliflower in our school premises," he proudly tells us. A child with many talents, Biplab studies in class IV. He is also gifted in the field of dramatics, willing to perform at the drop of the hat. At home, the 11-year-old likes playing football—his favourite sport—with his friends. His mother works in a tea plantation while his father is a farmer.

Biplab is particularly close to his father, Dipak Murmu, and even helps him in their field. He also tells his father about the day's events, including what he ate for lunch at the school. "They are running a good initiative," he says. "Whenever we ask children about their feedback on food, they appreciate it." The *pulao* and *dal* served every Wednesday is Biplab's favourite. "I like the food served on Wednesdays... It is tasty," he says as his eyes brighten.

Biplab aspires to join the army when he grows up. "When I grow up, I want to join the army," he confidently tells us. "I will catch bad people and punish them in order to keep the country safe."



Priya Maheshwari

student of Class VIII at Rawalwadi Relocation Site Primary School in Bhuj, Priya aspires to join the Indian army when she grows up. "I want to join the army and protect our country," she says. "It is not just my childhood dream, but also the dream of my mother." Priya wants to change the narrative that army posting at the border is only for men. She enthusiastically tells us, "I want to see more women at the border defending our country. I want to change people's mindset that women can't be at the border."

When asked about mid-day meals, she says, "Akshaya Patra food is delicious. It is full of different vegetables. We also get snacks in the form of *sukhdi*, peanuts, *churma*, etc. Among these, I love peanuts the most. We have a proper lunch here so we don't have to eat at home again." "Earlier we used to be very lean," she tells us while using the little finger to denote the same and follows it up with, "now we are healthy," with a thumbs up sign.

When asked how she will feel if some boy tells her that she can't join the army, she said "I will tell him that everyone's thinking is different. We should not comment on other people. We should first look at ourselves. We should never tell someone they can't do something. Instead, we should encourage them."





ashaswi studies in the class IX at Karnataka Public School, Honnaganahatti. She is a class topper and aspires to travel the world one day. Yashaswi's father is a farmer and her mother, a housewife. Both the parents understand the importance of education and food, particularly for a growing child.

She says "Food is very delicious. My favourite are *Rasam* and *Puliogre*. They gives us in large quantity that is sufficient for everyone. It's too hot. It is also delicious. It's neither too spicy nor salty. It is the proper amount that we want for the correct taste. So, I think it's very nice."



Aarif Abdul Rehman

student of Class VII - Ghodpar Primary School, Bhuj, Rehman eagerly waits for the lunch break every Monday because that is the day his favourite food is served. "Akshaya Patra food is very good," he says. "It is never too spicy or salty... it is very good. We get *dal*, *chawal*, *seng* (peanuts), *dalia*, *sukhdi*, *churmu*, etc. On Mondays, we get *dal-dhokli*, rice and *sukhdi*, which is my favourite and I look forward to it."

The fact that Rehman has visited Akshaya Patra kitchen in Bhuj adds to his perspective about the mid-day meal. "When I was in Class V, we went to Akshaya Patra. We saw big machines... a roti-making machine [among other things]. We saw different rooms where they were cleaning grains, putting vegetables in big containers, cleaning etc.," he recalls. "I didn't know that there were such big machines. Only when we went there did I realise that such big machines exist." The visit left Rehman and his friends wondering how much food these machines must be cooking. "We didn't know the food we eat comes from such a big kitchen," he admits.

- Akshaya Patra serves over 2 million children of more than 20,000 schools across 15 states and 2 UTs every day. The scale of the programme is a validation of the Foundation's credibility and the public trust in the organisation developed as a result of its sincere efforts over the years.
- Akshaya Patra strives to ensure transparency and accountability in all spheres of its functioning—right from fundraising to reporting of activities—through strict adherence to good governance practices. Reviewed financial statements and audit and evaluation reports are maintained and regularly sent to the governments and donors. These documents are also published in the annual report and made available on the organisation's website.
- Utmost care is taken to process donations as per the donors' mandates in adherence to donor reporting best practices. The organisation is also prepared for and encourages donor audits as it helps in assuring the donors that their funds are utilised efficiently and for the agreed purpose.
- Through experience, the Foundation has always believed that adherence to good governance policy helps in communicating effectively with stakeholders, thus making it easier for them to understand and appreciate the value being created.
- Since its inception, Akshaya Patra has strived to establish, maintain and improve its transparency and accountability standards through its persistent efforts. The numerous awards and recognitions bestowed on the organisation, including the coveted ICAI Gold Shield Award for Excellence in Financial Reporting, SAFA (South Asian Federation of Accountants) Best Presented Accounts Award, National Award for Child Welfare and CII Award for Food Safety, are a vindication of its efforts. Akshaya Patra has the distinction of being the only NGO to be inducted into the ICAI Hall of Fame—an honour reserved for winning the ICAI Gold Shield for five years in a row.


